scape of the delivery of instruction are just some of the challenges we face today. We look forward to you


sharing your insight and expertise through feedback systems - formal and informal. We want to meaningfully improve our system and processes to ensure our children are receiving a world-class education!

Newsweek's 2015 America's Top High Schools Ranking

WHRHS is number 142!!! The 2015 rankings of America's Top 500 High Schools were just released in August. WHRHS moved up from 212 in 2014 to 142 in 2015! This ranking is based on a variety of factors, including AP and SAT performance, dropout rates, graduation rate, college enrollment rate, and counselor to student ratio. Out of 56 NJ high schools that made the list, WHRHS is 30.

New Teachers for 2015–2016 School Year

Fourteen teachers new to Watchung Hills Regional High School were introduced to the school's entire faculty during a staff development assembly, Tuesday, Sept. 1.

The new faculty members in the World Languages Department are: David Weiner, Italian and English as a Second language; Lorraine Harwelik, Latin; Greg Wickey, French and Mery McNicholas, Spanish.

New teachers in the Music and Arts departments are: Minesh Shah, who had previous positions for band and music instruction at West Side High School, Newark, and Elizabeth High School, is band director and music teacher; and Emily Jordan, a Watchung Hills graduate who studied at the Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, teaches art. In the Special Services Department is Michael O'Brien, who is certified in both math and special education, and has served for 10

years in multiple coaching roles and as an aide, completed his student teaching assignment at Watchung Hills, and is now a special education teacher.

Goodness Herrera is an instructional aide. Marybeth Clark, R.N., who has worked as a nurse at Overlook Hospital, Summit, and Northside Hospital, Jersey City, among other assignments, is a member of the school nurse team. Allison Oliveira, who holds a doctorate from Rutgers, is a school psychologist. Sara Ahmed-Imadi is a health teacher on a leave replacement assignment.

In the Science Department, Chasity Tedeschi teaches Biology. Kathryn Matulonis is the new teacher in the English Department.



Back To School Night

One of the highlights of the annual Back To School Night on Thursday, Oct. 8, was the displays sponsored by extracurricular activity groups, class and student-wide government representatives, and sports teams.

Representatives from as many as 14 such student groups greeted parents, faculty and administrators with smiles and welcoming remarks, information about their clubs, and Watchung Hills apparel for sale.

Among the groups included were student government, the Script & Cue student theater group, the Choir and the Environmental Club, and the Softball, Field Hockey, Girls Lacrosse, Frisbee and Robotics teams.

The Watchung Hills Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) also had an informational. display PTO parent volunteers distributed maps of the school, and members of the Student Peer Leaders group staffed key major corridor intersections in the sprawling Watchung Hills building complex, to help parents locate their child's classrooms.



WHRHS Marching Warriors Band Victory

The Watchung Hills Regional High School Marching Warriors Band won first place in their class of schools, and fourth place overall, at the U.S. Bands-sponsored band competition held on Saturday, Sept. 12, at Edison High School, Edison Township.

New Watchung Hills Band Director Minesh Shah said the strong showing in the competition is particularly significant and impressive since it comes after the band has had to deal with both his arrival this year as the new band director as well as his introduction of a new system of teaching for marching band. He is familiar with this method, because he has used it as band instructor and director in other schools, but the students had not been familiar with it.

"Early on, however, the students realized they could get very good at marching band very quickly if they stuck to this system of learning," Shah said.

The Watchung Hills Warrior Band finished first among Class A schools, and fourth overall, Shah said. Class A schools are considered "emerging," or seeking to present consistently better performances, Shah said.

The theme for the band's routine this year is "A Night with Netflix." The set performance piece includes three musical selections, one each from three popular categories used by the internet-based broadcast network, Netflix. From "Classic Animation," the Band performs "The Circle of Life," from the movie "The Lion King." From "Trending

There are some 100 students participating this year in the Watchung Hills Marching Band, Shah said, with roughly equal numbers from each of the four years. Student musicians reported being proud of the perShah explained that each player has a mini spiral notebook of index cards that provide a visual of where players should be and what piece of music they should be performing at any given time during the performance. In between the moments when they are performing, they can refer to the mini notebook, worn on a lanyard around their necks, to double check to see where they should

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Community Book Night

A Community Book Discussion of the memoir, "Tales From the Bed, On Living, Dying and Having It All," was held for the general public at 7 p.m., Wednesday, Oct. 21.

The memoir was written by the late Jenifer Estess, as told to her sister, Valerie Estess. The Estess sisters and representatives from Project A.L.S., which was founded by the Estess family, spoke to the student body during grade-level assemblies at school on Wednesday, Oct. 14.

Tales From the Bed was one of the assigned summer reading selections last summer for all students at Watchung Hills. At her appearances, Valerie Estess spoke about the overall journey the Estess family has taken since their sister, Jenifer, was diagnosed in 1998. Jenifer Estess succumbed to A.L.S. in 2003. The memoir was first published in 2005.

Watchung Hills teachers have been using the book as a jump-off reference for discussions, and class lessons to guide students to learning about A.L.S. (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis), also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease. Throughout the year, students may explore various efforts that have been made to find treat-

ments and a cure for A.L.S., as well as efforts by various groups to advocate for more research about A.L.S., and for better care opportunities for A.L.S. patients and their families.

One of the leading groups advocating for more innovative and collaborative research

about A.L.S. is Project A.L.S. It was started by the Estess family after Jenifer Estess, a New York theater and film producer, was diagnosed. Jenifer was 35 when she was diagnosed. Project A.L.S. has already raised millions, and has worked closely with leading university-based research scientists to find treatments for A.L.S., and to actively collaborate in their research to bring about more breakthroughs.



Watchung Hills student extracurricular groups, including the student government, plan to also hold Project A.L.S. fundraising and awareness raising events all year.

First Music Honor Society Induction

The first Music Honor Society induction at Watchung Hills took place on October 22 at 7:00 pm in the PAC. Twenty-six students were inducted based on their auditions. The music honor society students

It is designed to recognize students for their academic and musical achievements, reward them for the accomplishments and service activities, and to inspire other students to excel at music and leadership." - WHRHS student Justin Horowitz was part of the New Jersey Youth Chorus who sang the National Anthem at the Jets/Redskins game played in the Met Life Stadium (East Rutherford, NJ) on October 18. There were 38 singers, 14 from the Camerata (young men's) division of NJYC and 24 from Coro Viva (boy's) division of NJYC.
- WHRHS Students David Kalwicz, Sarah Kelly, Julianne Lin, and Emma Marszalek all attended an AMA festival this summer (American Music Abroad). They toured Europe and sang in Europe's most prestigious churches and other various locations.
- Science teacher Anne Marie Johnson and 29 of our WHRHS students joined 27 other New Jersey high schools who worked with Rutgers University research scientists and project staff on the Waksman Student tributed to an authentic research project in molecular biology and bioinformatics. At our school, Ms. Johnson collaborated with the WSSP and instructed the 29 students. The students purified and analyzed ten DNA fragments, and five of them were suitable for publication on the NCBI DNA sequence database.
- A college essay writing workshop was held for seniors on September 21. Students examined the five Common Application essay prompts, brainstormed ideas for each topic, evaluated sample essays, and began writing an opening paragraph. The workshop was led by English teachers Roy Bumiller, Heather Farrington, Kim Gajewski, and Kristin Mannion; English Supervisor Marlene Stoto; and Director of Curriculum and Instruction Mary Ellen Phelan.
- On the morning of October 14, all freshmen, sophomores, and juniors took the PSAT. In the afternoon, the leaders of Project A.L.S. spoke at student assemblies, providing information about the disease and the organization's efforts to fund research. The student government will be engaged in fundraising activities to help the cause throughout the year. English teacher Laura Goodson has led the effort to partner with Project A.L.S.
- WHRHS hosted its fall college fair on Tuesday, October 20. Admission representatives from University of Chicago, Rutgers University, Seton Hall University, Rider University and The College of New Jersey attended. The evening began with a general panel followed by information sessions for students and parents.

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
