Woodland School Nominated to Apply for National Blue Ribbon Award

It is with great pride that I announce that Woodland School has been nominated by the New Jersey Department of Education to apply for the 2017 National Blue Ribbon School Award as an Exemplary High Performing School. Although at one time schools self-nominated for the award, this is no longer the case. Chief school administrators from the State Department of Education now have the responsibility of nominating schools. Eligible schools must demonstrate high or strongly improving student scores on state or nationally normed assessments in the last year tested; schools must also make Annual Yearly Progress in accordance with No Child Left Behind. Woodland School is <u>one</u> of only <u>nine</u> schools in the entire state that received this nomination. Since the program began in 1982, only four public elementary schools in Somerset County have been recognized with this award. Few schools have had the privilege of being nominated. This is an amazing accomplishment that we should all be proud of.

The Warren Township Committee passed a resolution declaring March 2017 "Whole Child Month" in Warren Township. This announcement coincides with an important event scheduled for Wednesday, March 8, 2017 - "A Community Conversation on the Whole Child."

That event, held in the Watchung Hills Regional High School Performing Arts Center, kicks off with an optional information session with the Warren Township Education Foundation at 6:00pm and performances from Watchung Hills student music ensembles beginning at 6:15pm.
