

Central School was involved with a reading initiative through Heifer International called *Read to Feed*. It ran from October through December. The students exceeded their fundraising efforts and collected over \$4,250. The organization's mission is to work with communities to end world hunger and poverty by linking communities with sustainable agriculture. Across the grade levels, the following were donated: 2 heifers, 1 goat, 2 water buffalos, 10 trios of rabbits, 3 pigs, 7 flocks of ducks, 7 flocks of chicks, and 7 llamas, as well as fish and honeybees. The students were especially proud of collectively raising funds to send a child to school, which is one of the categories within the *Read to Feed* program.



February 6<sup>th</sup> was National Wear Red Day and Warren Township Schools supported the American Heart Association's *Go Red for Women* campaign. Many staff members showed their support wholeHEARTedly! Thanks to our hard-working school nurses, Jan Brennan, Alexis Sacks, Doris Zanchelli, Harriet Stambaugh, and Lisa Lontai, our staff was provided with educational information on healthy hearts. At some

schools, pins and wristband fundraising opportunities were organized for staff, and a generous sum was collected and donated to the American Heart Association. At other schools, nurses shared chocolates, offered blood pressure screenings, and encouraged staff to "know their numbers" and view their heart health as a top priority.



The ALT PTO recently organized their second of three fruit and vegetable tastings for the year. As part of a campaign that Nurse Jan Brennan began two years ago, these events reinforce the importance of eating five fruits and vegetables daily. In fact, many students love it more than ice cream day! Everyone is able to sample fresh produce, such as yellow and red peppers, cherry tomatoes, blackberries, melons, and kiwi. Warren Middle School Peer Leaders visited ALT and Woodland. Promoting the concept of teamwork, the middle school students worked with kindergartners in the classes of Karen Marino, Barbara Pellicano, Amy Jordan-Eitelberg and Susan Leonard. Together they created snowmen, discussed various character traits, and acted out a story where four friends learn to work as a team. From PreK to 8<sup>th</sup> grade, Warren Township students shine!

Seventeen 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade E2 students collaborated this winter to write a mock trial for the New Jersey State Bar Foundation's Law Adventure Contest. Their mock trial submission is called "The Case of the Candy Con Non-Convict". It addresses 4<sup>th</sup> Amendment rights, reasonable force, mistaken identity, Amber Alerts and thermal imaging as a means of search and seizure. We wish them luck and expect the results in April.



ALT 5<sup>th</sup> graders were involved in a Space unit, developed by Mary Lynch. They explored the International Space Station and the Moon, learning about the various Apollo programs. The unit culminated with a creative planet project, including poems, books, and Google presentations. The PTO also sponsored a visit from The Franklin Institute.

Ceramics Club is just one of twenty clubs offered at Warren Middle School. Students are exploring and creating many different types of sculptures and pottery. Students choose what they wish to make based upon a variety of demonstrations. They are learning about hand modeling techniques and are creating works that incorporate slabs, coils and spheres. At the end, their pieces will be fired and glazed.





Rebecca Davenport's 4<sup>th</sup> grade Art Club was a great opportunity at Central School. Students explored a wide variety of art media and styles of art.

Students created a fall pumpkin landscape, an abstract positive and negative space artwork, a hanging clay slab using the additive process and various textures, a cherry

blossom painting, a still life of cacti, glass fusing and slumping to create bowls, and a chalk pastel monster using shading and blending techniques. These budding artists worked very hard and put great effort into their projects.





Woodland students love science, especially their unit on rocks and minerals. As a culmination activity, the PTO funded a presentation from the Dinosaur Rock group. The children expanded upon their knowledge, and enjoyed the hands-on excavation/mining activity; they were even able to crack open their own geode! Grade 3 students in the classes of Amanda McGrath and Lisa Meyer are currently learning about mixtures and chemical reactions as part of their Chemical Testing unit.

Guidance Counselor Trish Morris and Principal Milita conducted a classroom lesson on promoting kindness from the book <u>Each Kindness</u>. The story focused on paying it forward... with kindness. The story inspired Felicity Hentschel to create original artwork. This is one of many encouraging examples at Central School, where students shine brighter in their words and in their actions.





Principal Bond asked ALT students to submit designs for the Friendship Bench in their recess area. Many participated and both students and staff were able to vote. Congratulations to Janice Zhang, from Anabela Ordner's 4<sup>th</sup> grade class, whose design was selected. 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#### Staff Spotlights...

#### Meet staff who, in addition to educators, play an important role in students' education.

The Warren Township IT Team consists of four hard-working individuals. Lance Riegler has

worked for the district for 18 years and is the IT Director. He likes keeping staff and students on the cutting edge of technology. Riegler said, "Our work is for the staff and students. We strive to provide great service and new technologies for educational minds." Ken Creedon has been our Network Specialist for many of his 16 years. "What I like most are the great people I work with, and being part of bringing technology



into the classrooms for the students. It is exciting to see all that is going on, from the teachers using Smartboards for instruction, to the students using their Chromebooks, and everything in between," said Creedon.

Our Computer Technicians are Patrick MacNamara, hired in 2005, and Tim Ely, hired in 2013. They both continuously express how much they enjoy helping the staff and administration as well. "Each day poses new and different challenges to keep me on my toes, learning and growing," said MacNamara. "There is a great satisfaction in making sure everything is working properly," said Ely. "When I do my job, others can do theirs with more ease."

The Tech Team resolves the majority of technical issues throughout the district, handling networking, servers, printers, and desktop problems. They were instrumental with the 1:1 Chromebook initiative, which began in 2013 and will result in all 5<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> graders having their own Chromebooks in 2016. The team had to configure, label, inventory and distribute the Chromebooks to all five buildings. They also manage the WiFi network for both students and staff, and have made it efficient by installing Meru access points.

Tyler Tribelhorn is our Supervisor of Buildings & Grounds and a Certified Educational Facilities Manager. He has worked for Warren Township Schools since 1992. He manages maintenance



and custodial staff, under the direction of the Business Administrator. Mr. Tribelhorn concentrates on the health and comfort of our students and the safety of the educational environment. He also focuses on energy and cost savings. Mr. Tribelhorn oversees the management of construction projects and jobs performed by outside vendors. Kevin Potter has worked for the Buildings & Grounds Department for 18 years. He schedules maintenance

tasks and orders supplies. He and his colleagues have a variety of roles which include painting, electrical, plumbing, construction and snowplowing. Mr. Potter also operates and repairs the district's HVAC system. Working to support both Buildings & Grounds and Transportation, for 21 years, is Diane Bonanno. She prepares purchase orders, as well as bid packages. She organizes work orders submitted by district staff. Ms. Bonanno coordinates coverage for custodians and is instrumental in setting up training for staff. Each spring she processes paperwork for summer employees, who work diligently to prepare all of the buildings for the next school year.

Mrs. Ginny Lakatos is a Secretary in the main office of Warren Middle School. She was hired in 1991 and knows the requirements and responsibilities of the job inside and out! She maintains the facility usage calendar for the middle school, handles the ordering and tracking of all school supplies, and is involved with much of the preparation and detail work for graduation every year. She not only serves administrators, but she assists the staff as well. Mrs. Lakatos also has a

critical summer role, helping to welcome and enroll new students. Mrs. Suzanne Lathrop joined the main office as a 10-month Secretary at Warren Middle School in September 2014, though she has worked for the district in other capacities since 2007. Mrs. Lathrop is in charge of all attendance for the staff and deals with the substitutes at the middle school on a daily basis as well. Mrs. Lathrop interacts with students, parents, and



teachers, fielding their questions, solving problems, and assisting with specific needs as they arise. Mrs. Lathrop also helps with the athletics programs and events, acting as a liaison for referees and parents.



Chris Bacia, Calvin James, and Fred Quinlan are part of our Skilled Maintenance Team, who work for the Buildings & Grounds Department. Chris was hired in 2003 and is responsible for Angelo L. Tomaso School and Mt. Horeb School. Fred joined the team in 2001 and he is primary maintenance for Central School and Woodland School. Calvin was hired in 2008 and he focuses on Warren Middle School, Buildings & Grounds, and the Board of Education Administrative Offices. These men are equipped to handle calls related to electrical, plumbing, and heating issues; they work

hard to maintain the best educational environment for our staff and our students. If the need arises, they cover for custodial team members as well. In the winter months, they are the heroes of snow removal, working carefully to clear parking lots, and sidewalks.

Hired in 1988, Genny Trenson is the Main Office Secretary at Mt. Horeb School. She does so much for everyone in the building! Mrs. Trenson greets students, staff and parents with her warm, welcoming smile. She updates PowerSchool, emails report cards, and registers new Kindergartners as well as all new families. She also helps to secure substitutes and maintains confidential files. "I say with confidence, that



Mrs. Trenson can answer every question asked, and I am impressed with how she knows every student's name," said Principal Cook. Keeping order, not only in the organized Main Office, but throughout the building, is important to her.



Michael Perona is a valued employee who has worked for the Maintenance and Transportation Departments since 1993. He began as a night custodian and then transitioned to groundskeeper and then to the warehouse within the Maintenance Department. He is responsible for all inventory, shipped and received, as well as deliveries made to the schools and Board Office. He fills in as a substitute bus driver when needed. Jan Donlay and Tyler Tribelhorn, both of his bosses, report that he is always ready to help, in any capacity the job takes him. Also working for Tyler Tribelhorn is Michael Gonnella, who

has been the groundskeeper since 2006. A professional landscaper by trade, he does more than the average person in this position. He is a big asset who saves the district money. When not riding a mower, he is often on the backhoe working on grading and drainage to improve and maintain our grounds. He is a proud member of the Mt. Bethel Fire Dept. too.



Warren Middle School has a hard-working custodial staff. Martin Fonseca is the head day custodian who works with the dynamic duo of Estelle Raucci and Ralph Circelli during the school day. Chris Grundman is the head night custodian who works with the strong group of Lou Marciscano, Paul Muldowney, and Noy Manteria <u>during the evening</u>

shift. The entire custodial team takes pride in doing whatever it takes to make the middle school

clean and safe. Their responsibilities include securing doors and windows, cleaning classrooms and common areas, fixing and moving furniture, and maintaining the sidewalks and driveways. With the recent snow and ice, they were busy shoveling and spreading salt to make sure students and staff could enter the building without any



concerns. Although their work is often behind the scenes, their contributions to Warren Middle School are significant. The custodial staff at WMS truly makes the middle school shine!

Warren Township Schools is fortunate to have an array of talented individuals working as Paraprofessionals throughout the five schools in our district. Multi-duty Paraprofessionals are involved with classroom needs such as copying resource materials, organizing learning centers, and assisting with book rooms and classroom libraries. They often work in the main offices to support the building Principal and secretarial staff. Multi-duty Paraprofessionals escort students to the nurse, monitor lunch and recess, and help during safety drills. Classroom and 1:1 Paraprofessionals support students in both general education and special education classrooms. These men and women collaborate with the teachers, often helping to prepare materials. They reinforce specific learning objectives and skills, and encourage students through redirection and prompting. Paraprofessionals are beneficial in implementing structured behavioral plans and help with social interactions, organizational tasks, and communication, depending on individual student needs. Classroom and 1:1 Paraprofessionals are also present during lunch and recess; they are always a friendly face and a champion for children. Students in Warren Township are individuals and their needs are met through specific programmatic strategies. Our Paraprofessionals are in place to help students access their education. Although some of their work is behind the scenes, the importance of all Paraprofessionals is obvious. They are a critical addition to creating a positive classroom atmosphere and school climate. Dedicated, enthusiastic, and problem solvers, our Paraprofessionals are instrumental to the successful learning environments created in each and every school.
