This enrichment opportunity is available for students in grades three through five. Students will choose a specific scientific topic to study, create an experiment with measurable results, and maintain a scientific journal. Teachers Wendy Piller, Andrew Ahimovic, Michelle Cebula, Michele Gaglioti, Kara Miletic and Jill Ziobro are adding their skills and knowledge to enhance this event. Over the years, participation continues to grow. Approximately seventy young scientists will take part this year!

The Warren Middle School Math Team took home the first place award at the 8th annual St. Joseph's High School math contest by defeating 24 teams. Twenty WMS students participated and the top three scorers are considered a "team". Brandon Tang placed 10<sup>th</sup>, Christopher Yu placed 2<sup>nd</sup>, and Rachel Lu placed first overall, which meant the WMS team of these three students won the top honor in a contest of about 200 students. The St. Joe's math contest consisted of 16 challenging problems to be completed in 30 minutes. The head of St. Joe's math department said, "Warren continually raises the bar." WMS students' success is an indicator that our math program is working! Kudos to Warren Township Schools' math teachers who continue to demonstrate the best instructional practices and who consistently produce such fine math students in New Jersey!

In the days leading up to the winter vacation, the elementary instrumental students brought the holidays to the schools through their yearly holiday performances. To rave reviews, the strings and band students performed in the hallways of each elementary school under the direction of Bruce Gant and Tim Leonard. What festive cheer it provided the students and faculty!

In addition to the NASP National Championship last year, the largest archery tournament in history, PE Teacher Doug Clark registered ALT students with the WSSA (World Sport Stacking Association) to participate in yet another exciting event! The stack up record was 483,000 and the WSSA wanted to break the 500,000 mark, with the most number of people cupstacking around the world in one day. ALT had 125 students throughout the day stacking during their PE class. The event was a success worldwide with well over 500,000 stackers verified with the Guinness Book of World Records!

Several Warren staff members have been invited to be presenters on March 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> at the New York/New Jersey Google in Education Summit being held at Kean University under the auspices of the School for Global Education and Innovation. Robert Comba and Scott Cook, Principals of Warren Middle School and Mt. Horeb School respectively along with Mary Ellen Roberts, District Technology Supervisor and Michelle Zgombic, WMS Tech Coach/ SS Teacher will present information and share lessons learned about the Chromebook rollout. In addition, Michelle Zgombic will present her experiences with using Google sites to create a "virtual classroom".

Students at Central School were shining like stars in January when they presented their original

Winter Wonderland! Alison Hales orchestrated a 21<sup>st</sup> century learning project with the help of Laurie Donovan, Allison Reu, Rebecca Davenport, Patsy Iannacone and Melissa Stoeckel. Using recycled products such as cardboard boxes, shredded paper and plastic bottles, students learned about sustainability while integrating math concepts, science concepts, and vocabulary. It was an amazing sight to see!



At ALT School, Susan Kline's 4<sup>th</sup> grade REACH, TOO! students are learning about project management by researching and implementing a school service project. Students identified an issue important to them, how to improve indoor recess. After investigating different options, the students agreed upon a strategy and are now in the process of creating a budget and an implementation plan. Fifth grade REACH, TOO! students are conducting individual research where they are generating their own data and combining it with other primary and secondary sources of data. Students began with a question that piqued their curiosity... Can fish see colors? Do 5th graders get enough sleep? Who has faster reaction times, boys or girls? Students are designing experiments to discover the answers to these questions and will prepare their findings to share in the spring.

At Woodland School, PJ Jones' 4<sup>th</sup> grade REACH, TOO! students began reinvigorating the recycling program by teaching students and teachers at every grade level how to properly recycle paper and plastic products. They created a plan, collected necessary resources (such as new bins for recycling), made signs to increase awareness, and designed tech-savvy presentations that were delivered to each grade level. Fifth grade REACH, TOO! students are investigating newspapers and history by creating historical newspapers. They are writing articles about events that occurred during the 1950's and 1970's. They are learning about everything from the responsibilities that newspapers have for relaying news to proper news article writing to creating political cartoons. Perhaps this project will develop into the creation of a school newspaper!

REACH teacher Jill Zimmer took 5<sup>th</sup> grade students to visit Warren Municipal Court. They watched official proceedings followed by Officer Roselli showing the students the dispatch room where emergency calls are handled, the holding cells, the fingerprinting process, and more. This excursion was part of her law unit.

Second grade teacher Christine Rzasa, and her 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade colleagues, contacted Jim Brown from Bricks 4Kidz of Hunterdon-Somerset. He met with all Woodland first and second grade students to build Lego structures related to the Science curriculum which also introduces engineering and architecture principles. The first grade made windmills in connection with their unit on weather. Second graders built butterflies to go along with their unit on the life cycle of the butterfly. Working in cooperative pairs, they had to follow a set of plans that detailed how to create each structure. Most exciting was that the plans included batteries so that if the structure was built correctly, it would move. Many thanks to the Woodland PTO for funding this experience!

The 5<sup>th</sup> grade students have been studying space and the planets in Science. The Franklin Institute came to do a hands-on program about Space funded by the ALT PTO through Dream It/We Fund It. Presenter Mr. Paul did different experiments with the children, including shooting off a rocket, gravity experiments, and having the students pretend to be astronauts. What a great learning opportunity!





The 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students at Woodland School learned about their family connections to the United States during their Social Studies unit on immigration. This event culminated in an Immigration Day where children delivered speeches. They shared what they learned and created, such as clothespin people, and books highlighting many details about their countries of origin.

Can yoga improve brain power? That is one of the goals of the Yo-girls program being held at Warren Middle School under the direction of Lisa Lontai R.N. In addition to traditional yoga poses and stretches, this group of girls explore the philosophy and way of life of yoga. Becoming more centered, grounded, and energetic are just a few of the benefits the girls have described since beginning the classes in September. Yoga helps your circulatory and lymphatic system as well as reducing blood pressure. It can even lower blood sugar and boost HDL (good) cholesterol. Andrew Shi, 4<sup>th</sup> grade Central School student, participated in the Crescendo International Music Competition 2013. He won first place for his piano playing, and has been invited to perform at Carnegie Hall in early 2014!

ALT 5<sup>th</sup> grade Social Studies students have been learning about the first colonies that were developed in the United States. Students focused on formulating their own opinions about what might have happened to the Roanoke Colony. Multiple theories were concocted, and the students enjoyed creating their own scenarios while incorporating 21<sup>st</sup> century learning components. The "Lost Colony" was brought back to life!
