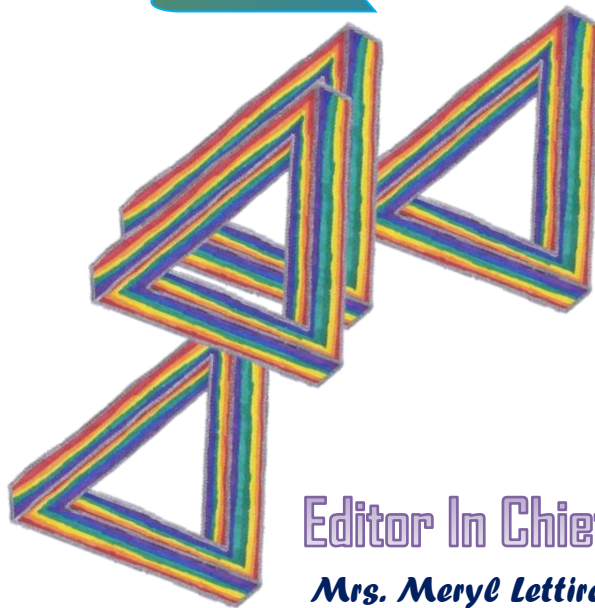

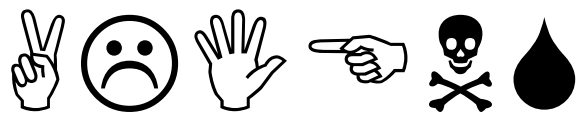

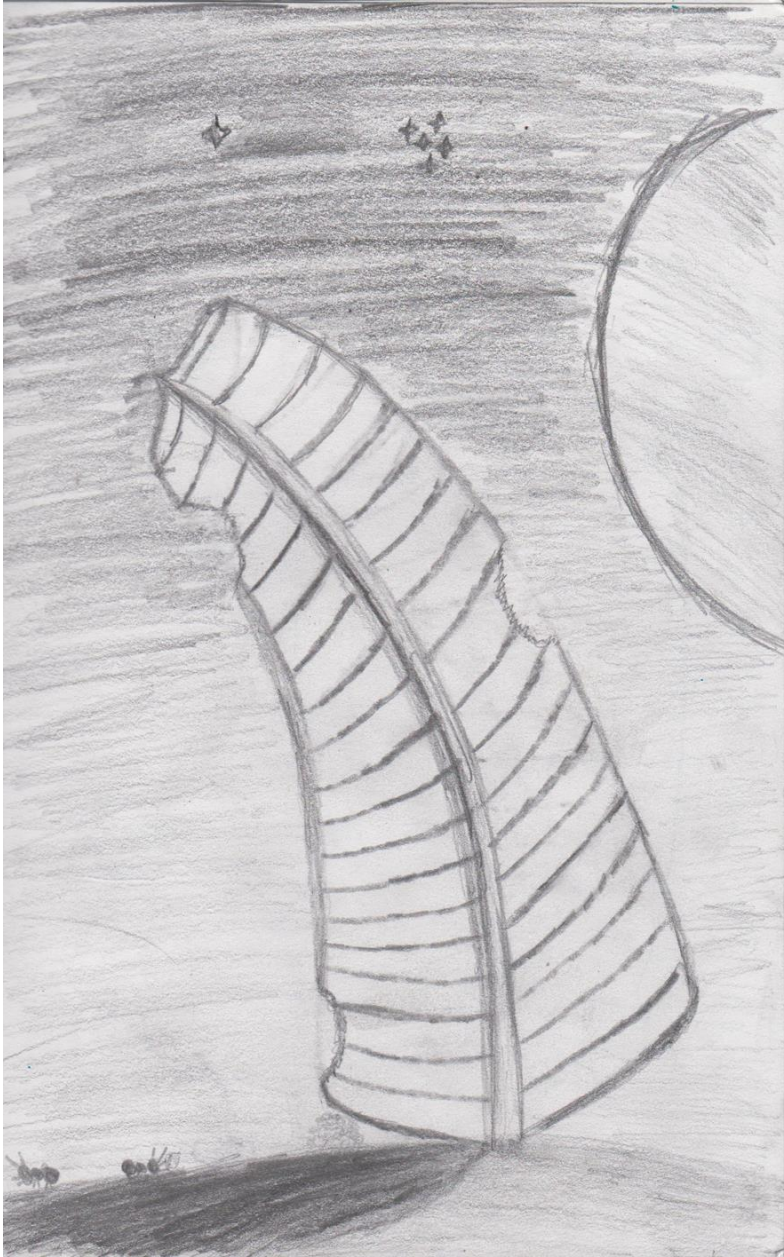

# A VERY ANCIENT HISTORY OF ART

Art has been around for a long time. But it is not simply enough to call art old and be done with it. When was the first piece of art created? What was the turning point in history, when our species had an idea and put it on some external surface? What were they thinking? What was their inspiration?

Art is not necessarily drawing, painting, or sculpting something. Art is a creation of any type, a communication of ideas. This is why cave art is often considered the oldest art form.

The oldest cave art discovered is in Indonesia, on an island called Sulawesi. The piece of art in question is a type of pig. This porcine-like creation is more than 35,400 years old, putting it before many ancient civilizations. Even older are some handprints along the floor and ceiling of the cave. These are probably about 40,000 years old.

Another extremely old piece of cave art is a simple red disk drawn in the Cueva de las Monedas in Spain. This disk is over 40,000 years old.

Some of the most famous specimens of cave art are the Lascaux Caves in France. There are paintings of horses, stags, bison, cattle, birds, bears, rhinoceros, human figures, and cats on the walls. The most famous hall of this cave is "The Hall of the Bulls". The largest piece of cave art, a 17-foot long bull can be located in this hall. This bull is one of four other large bulls that are the dominant figures of the hall.

Finally, the caves of Ajanta and Ellora, both in India, display ancient cave art as well. In the thirty caves of Ajanta, one can find extremely detailed Buddhist artwork dating back to 100 BC. The caves are elaborately decorated carved halls of worship. Ellora's caves are also famous for their age and art. Cave 16 contains the largest one-piece rock sculpture in the world.

So, with what materials did the ancient humans paint these forms? Some cave art, like the paintings in Lascaux, were created with red, yellow,

and black pigments. These pigments were made of iron oxide, hematite, and goethite, as well as manganese. The earliest pigments were thought to have been made from dirt and charcoal mixed with spit and animal fat.

How were these paintings created? Lichen and moss was most likely used to paint large areas. Maybe twigs were used to draw lines. Feathers might have been used for blending colors. It is probable that rudimentary horsehair brushes were used as well.

No matter how you analyze it, cave art is truly the origin of art. Today, when we look at *Starry Night* or the *Mona Lisa*, it is hard to think that these paintings are descendants of a red circle in Spain. However, art is just like history - it has a cause and an effect. Cave art is a cause, and society we experience today is the effect. Society will always be influenced by the concepts and ideas communicated by art and the personal expression of individual artists.
